



A time to keep silence and a time to speak




Pleated skirts and cuffed levis

The work and involvement that went into this event will not be soon forgotten.








One of the Special moments




Love, death and reality

Secrets to success and fame




Massacre the Cowboys in Big

Open campus: we tried it and . . .






Controversy marked election


The WASC is happy to announce

the action taken by the Accrediting Commission for Secondary Schools wherein the William S. Hart High School was granted a full term of accreditation, expiring on June 30, 1978, with a progress report to be submitted to the Commission by June 30, 1976." was the opening statement in the Western Association of Schools and Collegee' letter of accreditation. These words were long awaited for by many a perspiring brow in the community.

Accreditation is a rating process by which all high schools, in the western states, are kept up to par, underlining a school's strong points and deficiencies. School epirit remained high, and with the aid of pep equad, the hearty enthusiasm of the crowd backed Indian teams.






For the past year the aim of Latinos Unidos was to improve the status of the Mexican-American student for future life. The club also had guest epeakers from California State University.






Students were given many opportunities to become involved in a variety of governmental operations providing them with first hand knowledge which will be of value in later years.


were two of the needs of the tired Hart campus.




Ring making and two dimensional






Emphasizing foreign culture

The doors opened by the language department shall not be forgotten by their passers through.






The Class of 1973 is proud
